## From the President's Desk...

The number one ranked "gadget" in the world today is the smart phone. Yep, the world is addicted to technology and the grid that supports it. According to recent statistics, 1.2 billion smart phones were sold in 2014 alone, while 93% of the world's population is connected to some type of mobile device already. In 6 years it is estimated that 60 billion devices will be connected to "the grid" ushering in Smart Cities (a whole other topic for conversation).

For some of us it feels like a brave new world. Others of us, especially our youth, are growing up with such technology. For them it is the world. So, why then is there sometimes a "disconnect" with the education process? Why, for example, does our New Mexico high school graduation rate for the past years hover around 60%, in spite of ongoing programs?


The latest such program is the PARCC's test—a month-long process that attempts to evaluate our high school students. Few students like testing, period...... That is certainly some of the feedback I received recently from 3 sophomore ladies and 1 freshman young man that have been attending a weekly lunch mentoring program sponsored by the Martin Luther King Commission. "I think I failed the math", "The questions were confusing", "I hope I passed the English—had to write 3 essays" were just a few of the comments. But, smart phone technology they get. Even while talking to them, one student took my picture and did the Instagram thing. I thought I was going to get a cup of instant coffee.

No one debates that our young people need to have the

necessary skills to succeed in our world. As US House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi in a visit this past week to New Mexico said: "Nothing brings more money to the Treasury than the education of the American people." (Mark Oswald, Albuquerque Journal, 3/21/15). Local businesses need an educated/trained workforce, a fact also being promoted by the recent appointment by Governor Martinez of Dr. Barbara Damron as Cabinet Secretary of Higher Education.

But, how do we better communicate the vision expressed by such community leaders to our youth? Perhaps using some of the same technology so popular among our "leaders of tomorrow" will help. Engaging them in projects that have a "technological" appeal while allowing them to develop other necessary social, educational, and job skills, seems like a must. Sister City type projects that expose students to the international world while making life-long friendships can, I think, be part of the answer.

So, come and see technology in action by our youth!! Two great events are coming up in the next few months: 1) April 30 RoboRAVES' International student mixer at the Convention Center. 500 students from other countries are expected and RoboRAVE wants them to meet you! 2) June 14 Annual meeting—after a nice lunch we will have an actual robotics demonstration by a group of students showing us how technology and culture can come together.
