After 12 plus years, our old website was showing its age, and the time had come for a fresh look with updated features. So, we asked for bids for a redesign, and LionSky in Albuquerque was contracted to do the work. After many meetings via Zoom, work started in December, and quickly took shape, along with our new logo. Here's our new look.



Our new HOME page is modern and displays more of what our organization is all about: people to people, culture, and economic development with the City of Albuquerque. The new site was designed to be easier to negotiate, primarily with more photos, less text, and has been reorganized so users can quickly move through the various pages to find what they're looking for.

The Membership area has been completely redesigned and will be less time consuming for our membership committee of one. Members may apply or renew yearly (July 1 through June 30) completely online and will receive a receipt immediately after payment. For our members who want to continue to use paper and snail mail, they can continue to print out a Membership form from our website and mail it to us with a check.

2019 Music Program in Helmstedt

Between 2016 and 2018, I met with Helmstedt Chair Siegfried Dehning to discuss organizing a joint music program for its youth. It was decided that the two sister cities would organize a youth music program for the summer of 2019. Initially, the plan was for students from Helmstedt to visit Albuquerque and stay with host families for 10 days. They would rehearse and perform together at two public



venues. Two weeks later the Albuquerque students would go to Helmstedt to rehearse and perform. Due to scheduling conflicts in January of 2019, it was decided that students from Albuquerque would only go to Helmstedt.



Ten Albuquerque students that were 8th and 9th graders from three public schools signed up. Eisenhower Middle school and Albuquerque Youth Symphony Director Sam Nesbit volunteered to be the director. Meetings were held on Skype with Sam Nesbit and the Helmstedt music school director

Gheorghe Herdeanu and it was decided that Sam would be the lead Director and head of the music program. Prior to the group departing for Germany, Sam Nesbit ordered the sheet music and arranged for the

youth to meet and rehearse 3 times. The youth also started communicating online before we left for Germany.

The students traveled with director Sam Nesbit, chaperone and parent Katheryn Probasco and me from July 9th to July 20th. Along with visiting Helmstedt, the group also toured parts of Berlin, Potsdam, Konigslutter, Hannover, and



Konigslutter, Hannover, and Helmstedt's Sister city Haldensleben. In Haldensleben the group visited their deputy Mayor and was provided a private city tour. They also visited the gardens of Hundisburg castle and attended



the gardens of Hundisburg castle and attended a classical trumpet performance.

During their time in Helmstedt, the Albuquerque students received a guided walking tour of the city and met with Helmstedt Mayor Schobert. The students rehearsed most days with students from Helmstedt and finally performed on July 18th in Helmstedt's former university building Juleum completed in 1592. The students performed the Hungarian Dance, Three Ayres, The Forge of Vulcan, Pirates of the Caribbean, Salvation is Created and the United States and German National Anthems. The performance was well attended and received. Helmstedt Partner Cities and Helmstedt town hall organized and promoted the free event. Two local newspapers published articles detailing the success of the performance and on the sister cities relationship between Albuquerque and Helmstedt.

It did take a lot of time planning but it was well worth it. I still received positive feedback from the students and parents and many of the students are still in contact with each other. Helmstedt Chair for Albuquerque Siegfried Dehning stepped down from the Helmstedt board in January of 2021. We want to thank him for working with Albuquerque Sister Cities over the last five years. We wish him the best and look forward to working with his successor Margrit Niemann. We hope to coordinate another youth music exchange with Helmstedt when it is safe to travel.


For decades, Sister Cities International has leveraged the power that art has to transform societies and transcend cultural boundaries through the Young Artists



We have passed along one of your cards to the Mayor of Ashgabat as well. Jackie Moore, our Public Diplomacy Officer told me that Mellie did the beautiful art work—well done!

The COVID19 pandemic has had an impact on many of our outreach initiatives, including Sister Cities. We would like nothing more than to energize the Sister City relationship with Ashgabat in the future. Our dedicated team will be looking for opportunities to keep this on the agenda.
