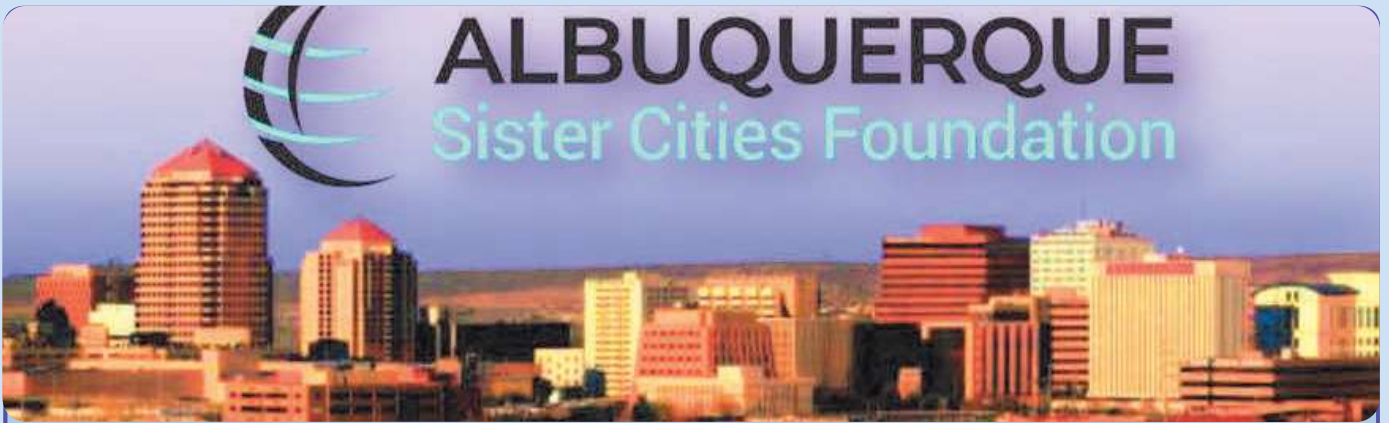

Mexico/New Mexico Advocacy Day by Aimeé González Estrada and Yuriria Morales- Mangone

On January 21, 2026, the New Mexico State Legislature, for the first time in its history, formally proclaimed Mexico–New Mexico Advocacy Day, recognizing the deep historical, cultural, economic, and community ties between Mexico and New Mexico, as well as the significant contributions of the Mexican and Mexican-origin community across the state. The commemorative day, organized by the Consulate of Mexico in Albuquerque in collaboration with the Legislature, CSG, and regional partners, took place in Santa Fe and included a morning press conference at the State Capitol, followed by official legislative recognition. Afternoon programming featured a community event and a private reception. In parallel, a cultural tribute honoring Juan Gabriel, “El Divo de Juárez,” celebrates his enduring impact on New Mexico’s cultural and social fabric. The event welcomed a distinguished delegation from Chihuahua and other Mexican states—including mayors, business leaders, academic representatives, and governmental and non-governmental organizations—along with multiple parallel meetings between Mexico and New Mexico delegations, underscoring the strategic and forward-looking nature of this historic binational engagement.

WHEREAS, as an acknowledgment of the importance of the Mexico-New Mexico relationship, the House of Representatives and the Mexican consulate based in Albuquerque recognize the importance of establishing a forum where political, business and academic actors from both governments may highlight topics of interest in the bilateral relationship and present recommendations for public policy development; and

WHEREAS, topics of discussion for such a forum may include issues impacting the Mexico-New Mexico region, from education and public health to cross-border development; and

WHEREAS, the flow of goods and people across the border is critical to the state's success, and discussions that improve bilateral cooperation will bolster economic growth and prosperity;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the House of Representatives express support for the establishment of Mexico-New Mexico Advocacy Day; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that January 21, 2026 be declared "Mexico-New Mexico Advocacy Day" in the House of Representatives in celebration of the critical partnership and shared interests in culture, the arts and economic prosperity between Mexico and New Mexico; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the House of Representatives recognize that January 21, 2026 is the inaugural celebration of Mexico-New Mexico Advocacy Day and hope this commemorative day will become an annual event.

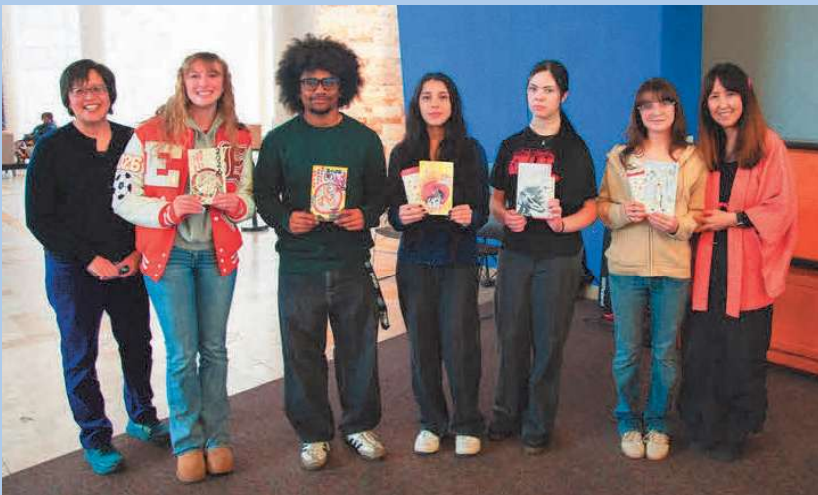

Samia Assed and Lynne Newton, chair and co-chair for this new agreement, are working to build this relationship. Mayoral elections took place on April 25, 2026 in the West Bank. When results are in, we will begin in earnest to build this important bridge and work together to find ways to support Jericho's needs, while strengthening cultural ties.

The Sister City Program administered by Sister Cities International was initiated by the President of United States of America in 1956 to encourage greater friendship and understanding between United States and other nations through direct personal contact; and

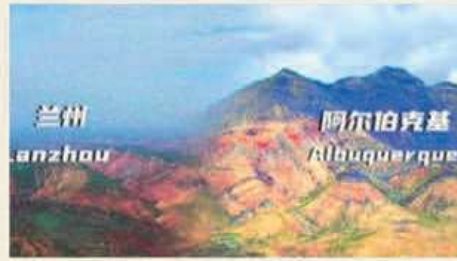

Samia prides herself in being a Palestinian Muslim-American. A grassroots feminist and mother of nine, Samia has advocated as well as organized for oppressed, poor, and marginalized people locally, nationally, and internationally. She has served as Chair and board member of the city of Albuquerque's Human Rights Board and is the newly elected Chair of the Friendship City of Jericho - Albuquerque. By doing such work, Samia has brought much needed insight into intersectional movements building with Palestinian, Indigenous, Chicano, Black, Jewish, and Muslim communities. Samia has facilitated and mediated many community conversations and continues to work on addressing anti-racism, Islamophobia, xenophobia, and anti-Palestinian racism. Samia's many years of experience organizing events and marches have also allowed her to build and mobilize coalitions on many fronts including within interfaith communities, intersectional feminism, human rights, civil rights, and environmental justice. Samia served on the National Women's March C-4 board and currently serves as Board Secretary of the Women's March WIN PAC and Chair of NM Women's March. Samia has previously served as Chair of the ACPJ, SWOP, and the NM Poor People's Campaign.



Welcome to the board Dr. Lynne Newton - Jericho Co-Chair

Dr. Lynne Newton has a PhD in Anthropology from the University of Minnesota. Her dissertation research, conducted in the Mahra region of Yemen from 1997-2001, focused on Islamic period regional trade and pilgrimage. A Fulbright in 2005 gave her the opportunity to expand that research across the border in Dhofar, the southern region of Oman. Newton remained in Oman to work with the Office of the Advisor to HM the Sultan for Cultural Affairs to continue archaeological work, but also to help establish a number of UNESCO World Heritage Sites that tell the history of the incense trade. As the co-director of excavations at Al Baleed, an Islamic period port on the Dhofar coast and UNESCO World Heritage Site, Newton focused on maritime trade and the connections between the Red Sea, Indian Ocean and the Persian Gulf. As the curator of maritime history at the National Museum of Qatar in Doha from 2011-2015, she continued this research while working with international teams to deliver the largest museum at that time in the region. After nearly twenty years in Arabia, she relocated to New Mexico in 2015, but has since consulted on heritage projects in Dubai and Oman. Currently Dr. Newton is the exhibitions curator at the Anderson Abruzzo Albuquerque International Balloon Museum, and is honored to serve as co-chair of Albuquerque's Friendship City with Jericho.
